
We, the students felt that our tape made good discussion, and raised a lot of questions for the youth in our community.

SEGMENT 1


- Do you think the deployment of U.S troops to the Persian Gulf was an agressive or a necessary defensive act taken by the U.S.?

- 6. What could have been done by the U.S. to help solve the conflict between Iraq & Kuwait in a less threatening and non-military manner?



- 1. Do you believe that blacks & other minorities of color face racism within the military? Do you know of any examples?
- 2. Approximately 1/3 of the U.S. troops in the Persian Gulf were people of color, many were women. Some people say this is a sign of advancement for blacks & women, while others say it is a sign of limited opportunities in our society. What do you think?
- 3. Why do you think that more poor and middle class people die in wars than rich people?
- 4. During the Vietnam War, poor & middle class men were sent to combat, while the sons of rich senators and state representatives were given deferments. How does this make you feel?
- 5. Do you think the Military uses their college education funds as a way to entrap less fortunate minorities into joining? Why?/Why not?
- 6. If you were considering going into the Military, has this recent Gulf War given you any doubts, as to whether you would ever enlist? Or, has the war made you more interested in enlisting?

A BRIEF POST-WAR UPDATE

FACTS: The Destruction Of Iraq

Up to 200,000 Iraqi soldiers were killed, the Pentagon estimates.

U.S bombs destroyed Iraqs electrical system, water and sewage systems. Hospitals have no medicine. Prescriptions are needed in order for sick children to get powdered milk.

1990 Harvard University study has reported that 55,000 kids under the age 5 have already died due to U.S. bombings and sanctions. They are also predicting that 170,000 more children will die due to starvation & other epidemics.

The U.S. still has economic sanctions on Iraq. Iraq can't sell any oil or import any medicine & medical supplies.

FACTS: Many U.S soldiers filed for Conscientious objector discharges.

Over 2,500 U.S. soldiers filed for Conscientious Objector discharges. Many are now being held in military prisons waiting to be court marshalled. They face up to 7 yrs. in prison for Desertion & Missing Movement.

U.S. CASUALTIES OF THE U.S. WAR WITH IRAQ: 369 deaths reported, 330 names released, 5 listed missing. (Source: Vietnam Veterans Against The War, 5/28/91).

FACTS: Is America trying to sell patriotism to it's young people?

Operation Desert Shield/Storm products hit the store shelves so quickly, one wondered if someone in the toy industry had a direct line to the Pentagon. Even before the bombing started manufactures produced war toys to excite the young kids about the war.

The war made a crossover with war toys for girls. One evening news broadcast showed a girl carrying a rifle saying she wanted to be just like the female reservists in Saudi Arabia.

How do you feel about America trying to influence it's young kids into joining the military?

SUGGESTED RESEARCH TOPICS FOR STUDENTS AFTER VIEWING "CAUGHT: IN THE MIDDLE OF THE CRISIS"

- 1. What impact did the U.S. War against Iraq have on the Kurdish people? What are the current conditions of the Kurds?
- 2. What are the short, and long term, environmental effects of the Persian Gulf War?
- 3. What have the U.S. troops who served in the Middle East "come home" to? Interview several veterans of the war to find out their opinions on the war, and the current conditions they face on their jobs, in their communities, and in their families.
- 4. Is Kuwait more "democratic" since the U.S. pushed out Iraqi troops? Research the conditions and social status of women, Palestinians, and other "foreign" workers in Kuwait.
- 5. The Proposed Middle East Peace Conference: Who called for it and why? What are the positions of the United States, the Soviet Union, Israel, the Palestine Liberation Organization, and the Arab countries on such a "peace conference?"
- 6. Oil: Research the industrial and consumer prices for oil and gasoline, before and after the war; what U.S. oil corporations are now functioning in Kuwait; the current reserves of oil in various countries; alternative energy sources for the United States.
